MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Held Saturday, August 10, 2019 Memorial Pines, Muldrew Lakes

Opening: 10:00 a.m.

President Janet Kincaid introduces Mayor Paul Kelly.

Mayor Kelly spoke to us about the Town of Gravenhurst and the exciting things that are happening. He also spoke on:

- The bad winter we just came through; not due to extreme cold or snow, but due to the numerous freeze-thaw events that left our roads in bad shape and contributed to the flooding.
- Housing in Gravenhurst is not affordable to young families. A new development is being built which will have townhomes and single-family dwellings. The prices will range from \$200,000 to \$375,000.
- Muskoka Centre the deal with the Maple Leaf School fell through. Council wants whatever goes onto the property to be an economic driver. Council turned to the government to ask for time to pursue something that is institutional or economic driven, as opposed to the land being sold and developed. The government gave them a year to investigate options.
- Council has created a Youth Council which is a way of engaging the youth of the town in the business of the town. If you want them to stay and live here, you must let them be involved.
- Muskoka Airport Porter Airlines has been flying from Billy Bishop to Muskoka Mondays and Thursdays this summer. Porter marketed this service to American businessmen. Now Muskoka residence have discovered the service and the flights last week were full. A round trip costs approximately \$176.
- Economic Development you will notice many empty stores in town, but also many new businesses that have set up. The empty stores are the result of landlords wanting too much rent. There are new businesses moving to town, i.e. The Butcher's Daughters. Sawdust City Brewery is working on creating a 400-person conference centre in the old Canadian Tire service bays attached to their building.

Mayor Kelly mentioned that the town and the cottagers need to work together, not confrontationally.

Questions for the Mayor included:

- The roads need attention a long term plan approach needs to be looked at by the Town. If you are interested in when your road is next scheduled for maintain/upgrade, check the Town website.
- Planning Applications if the Planning Department approves an application, then Council votes it down. If the landowner wants to pursue the application, Council must to hire their own lawyer and planner to defend their decision.

- Fire Bans – the most recent ban was lifted about a week ago. Should the fire department be called to a bonfire, etc. during a fire ban, the property owner will be billed for the fire departments time and equipment.

Quorum – are 30 members present in person?

We have a quorum -- at one point there were 47 people present.

Report of the President - Janet Kincaid

Janet started out by saying that Muldrew is very lucky to be in the Severn Watershed, as we missed the extreme flooding experienced by those in the Muskoka Watershed this past spring.

The Fire Ban had been in effect for a lot of the summer but was lifted about 10 days ago.

Janet also included a report on the <u>Canoe & Swim Regatta</u>: There is a wonderful group of young people on this lake who are leading and participating in the Canoe & Swim Regatta. There were 77 participants. Thank you to Brent Hughes for organizing this year's regatta. Brent will be back next year as well.

- Setting up pre-registration for events like the regatta and hopes to expand on this for next year.
- Had PayPal option removed from membership renewals. Members can now pay with VISA and MasterCard
- Next will be updating the website so it is easier to view on tablets and phones
- Facebook Page is also updated by Brent and if you DM us, you will usually get a response within 24 hours.

At this point Janet mentioned a former director, Dave Fenwick, who recently passed away.

Fall and Winter Inspections will be done this year by Russ Spaulding as he committed to this already. However, as he is moving off the lake and selling his place, he has asked that this be his last year. As a result, the Board will have to investigate what can be offered with next year's membership.

The Canoe Lessons were led by Janet Allen and Liz Stinson on the Stinson's beach with week before the regatta. All funds collected will be donated to Moorlands Camp.

The Swim and Canoe Regatta had 77 participants, many old families keeping up the tradition.

There was a Community Event in July a Silent Auction and Bake Sale. The money raised will be set aside for use on developing a Lake Plan.

Also, at the Event were the OPP who have 1400 lakes to cover with two boats. They do come to our lake, but our find our cottagers are diligent and are looking out for each other. One interesting comment from the police was the group that has the highest rate of incidents are males 25 - 45 years of age. It seems sun and testosterone don't mix.

There was also a presentation by Safe and Quiet Lakes at the Event, but the weather did not help with their presentation as that was when the rain started.

Janet mentioned that she had some "No Wake Zone" signs available for anyone who wanted to post one or more on their property. They are for narrow areas that are experiencing erosion.

Janet took a few questions from the floor:

Rob Carter – Is the Association going to do anything about "wake surfing"? This is causing extreme damage to shorelines. Answer: We need to education people. Neighbours speak to neighbours.

Brian Phillips – Is the Association responsible for the waterski course? Answer: Mark Mitchell and Ted Nixon are the ones involved in this.

A mention was made that the Sailing Regatta is taking place today at 12:30 off the Hookery.

There are nine church services this summer. According to Esther Ewing there have been about 40 people attending each week.

Bugs in the Mud took place at two locations this year – early July at Luke's cottage; and late July at Twist's cottage. The results will be available in the fall.

The Lake Plan Steering Committee will be meeting on August 17 at Memorial Pines. There were 85 people who indicated their interest in the survey. Other cottagers are invited to join in and have your voices heard.

There have also been a Bio Blitz and Bird Walk which were well attended. Tomorrow there is a Loon Paddle at 2:00 p.m.

The Board will be looking at some constitutional changes to enable us to include the Inn on the Lake trailer owners as associate members. Jim Sylph as offered to head up this endeavour.

Kate thanked Bill Banks and Cindy Fenwick, the Financial Committee, for the work on reviewing the books.

Cindy reported that she and Bill looked over the Financial Report and other items and found that all was in order.

Kate has advised that the Finance Committee should be renamed to Financial Review Committee to more properly reflect their function.

Kate reviewed the report which indicated that membership is down, that the silent auction made money which is being held for use toward the Lake Plan, and that any money collected for inspections are a flow-through item so don't make a difference to the income of the Association, as do the monies collected at the canoe lessons and church services.

John Duffy – how do we make to new members? Answer: We are adding a membership director this year.

Keith Stinson – what has happened to water quality testing? Should we be paying people to do this? This needs to be done.

Motion: by Kate Hyland, seconded by John Duffy, to accept the 2018 Financial Report. Carried.

Kate went on to report on the Association's finance up to June 30 of this year.

- Memberships are up
- Revenue is up
- Expenses are up
- We will have a surplus of funds

A question was asked why the Environmental Fund is restricted? Answer: This money was collected decades ago when the Association was arranging gypsy moth spraying. When the program finished there were fund left over. Rather than try to figure out which cottagers got funds, and how much they should get, it was decided to hold the funds for the next environmental need.

Mr. Phillips – why is the Lake Plan fund not restricted. Answer: This money may or may not be necessary as we are attempting to get grants to pay for the Lake Plan.

Nominations Committee:

Janet set out that we are looking for a secretary, vice president and a north lake director. Ted Alley will be joining the Board as a director.

Motion: by Ann Alley, seconded by Don Smith that Tim Luke become President and Ted Alley become a director for the next two-year term. Carried.

Lake Plan – Sarah Bale

Here's what I think needs to happen:

- 1) We need to conduct a background study on the lake as a basis for the lake plan (much of this we can take from last lake plan effort) and conduct research on best practices regarding lake management plans
- 2) Review the local planning framework and identify gaps in planning policies to address issues of importance on Muldrew Lake (as determined by residents)
- 3) Create a community lake plan containing lake-specific policies and regulations to update/revise the Gravenhurst Official Plan and zoning bylaw to address the issues identified by community members
- 4) Create a stewardship plan (voluntary actions) to address issues that cannot be addressed adequately through policy

How we do this:

- 1) Host a series of community workshops. The first workshop would focus on identifying the main issues, the second workshop would present options to address these issues, and third workshop would present a draft set of policies, a draft stewardship plan, etc. for feedback/comments
- 2) Create a final two-part document that addresses stewardship and policy. This is to be a living document that has action items to be actively worked upon and evaluated at certain intervals. The lake plan should be updated every 5-10 years.
- 3) Liaise with Town about when best time to implement this policy is (e.g., do we need to wait for the next Official Plan update, or can we apply for an Official Plan Amendment and Zoning By-law Amendment).

Next Steps:

- 1) August 17th meeting: 2:30 pm at Memorial Pines
- Information on general process we will follow; look at other examples of comprehensive lake plans for inspiration; start to put together an issues list; and strike a steering committee or task force
- Talk about fundraising strategy
- Meeting is for everyone interested, no commitment for any jobs is necessary
- 2) Depending on the scope defined by the membership for this project, could cost between \$8000 and \$20,000 (keeping in mind planning applications alone could cost between \$5000 and \$10,000)
- 3) Retain services of EcoVue Consulting (planning firm Sarah works for) so that Sarah can work on the reports and draft policy during work hours bonus of having a planning consultant work on the project who has deep roots on Muldrew. Will also give project access to numerous resources that would otherwise be unavailable as well as supervision by senior planning staff with 30+ years experience.

Please call me if any of this doesn't make sense or you want to talk about it. You don't have to say all of this at the meeting if you don't want to. But it would be nice to at least encourage people who are interested to come out on the 17th, and promote the Loon Paddle this Sunday (August 11th at 2pm - meeting at Memorial Pines with canoes or can jump in a boat with someone else).

Jane White – next year could the fireworks be moved back from the islands? There was an awful lot of debris afterwards. Answer: The Board will investigate this.

Julie Alexander --- can anyone attend and speak at the Lake Plan Steering Committee meeting. Answer: Yes.

At this point the meeting is turned over to our new President – Tim Luke.

Tim gave us a brief overview of what he envisions for his term including:

- The Boards' roles are changing, if you are interested in getting involved, let us know.
- We all share a passion for the lake.
- Education is a key to keeping the lake safe and enjoyable.

- Respect of our neighbours and our environment.

- Working together gets things.

- Anyone wishing to volunteer, speak to Tim.

One of the biggest challenges ahead is communicating with new people to the lake and getting them involved.

Muldrew Spirit is something we all have though it means different things to each of us.

Other Business:

Rattlesnakes -- there have been more sightings this year. Should anyone get bitten, call 911 and an ambulance will take you to the nearest hospital with antivenom.

John Duffy is a self-certified rattlesnake catcher. You can reach him at 1585 North Lake Road. He will help you out.

There is available on Amazon a snake grabber.

Notes to the Financial Statements Year Ended December 31, 2019

1. Organization

The purpose of the Association is to:

- -serve the Muldrew Lakes community as a whole;
- -act as an advocacy role to various levels of government, agencies or other appropriate bodies to safeguard the interests of the community;
- -foster a co-operative, mutually caring environment;
- -maximize recreational opportunities while respecting the fragility of the Lakes' ecosystems;
- -act in co-operation with other associations in the interests of the community;
- -provide and maintain appropriate property which supports the common interests of the community and;
- -maintain the natural amphitheatre known as Memorial Pines.

The Association was incorporated without share capital, is a non-profit organization under the Income Tax Act and is exempt from income tax.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies

Fund accounting

Muldrew Lakes Cottagers' Association follows the restricted fund method of accounting.

The General Fund accounts for the Association's programs delivery and administrative services.

The Environmental Fund is internally restricted and was created by a motion of the general membership as a fund to address environmental issues.

Contributed Services and Materials

Volunteers contribute hundreds of hours each year to assist Muldrew Lakes Cottagers' Association in carrying out its service delivery activities. Because of the difficulty of determining their fair value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements. Contributed materials are not recorded in the financial statements.

Property, docks and equipment

The cost of property, docks and equipment is expended when purchased

3. Financial instruments

It is management's opinion that the Association is not exposed to significant interest rate, currency of credit risks arising from its financial instruments.

4. Land ownership

The Association owns several parcels of land, the value of these assets are not reflected in the financial statements as they were donated to the Association. They include land at the following locations: North Lake - Indian Landing, South Lake - Peck's Landing, Memorial Pines and McLaughlin Point on Middle Landing.
